#### ALONG THE WAY ...

Fall and Winter holidays have generally been easy for me to remember, but the Spring and Summer ones, except for July 4<sup>th</sup>, which is rather straightforward, have evaded my long-term memory, mainly because they are what I call "floaters." They are on a different number date every year. And I usually get **Memorial Day** and Veterans' Day mixed up. But I think I will remember these two from now on. We just "celebrated" Memorial Day on the last Monday of May. Marking the unofficial start of summer, I knew that the school year always ended near this holiday, which was always something to celebrate!

This year I became curious enough to ask Google how many American soldiers have died in our wars since 1775. Wikipedia had the most readily available stats, so I will use those. From the Revolutionary War until now, as many as 1.5 million US soldiers were wounded and at least 1,354,664 have died during wartime. And this detail is fascinating: of those killed, over half perished outside of combat, from things like accidents and diseases. Before and including WWI, disease was the bane of soldiers, killing off enormous numbers of military personnel. Another statistic that is sobering is that almost half of the death-toll took place during the Civil War. By comparison, France saw upwards of 1,397,800 of their soldiers die during WWI alone. # THEOLOGY FOR WORSHIP

by JD Crowley, missionary to the tribes of Ratanakiri, Cambodia

(The following is an edited re-publication of JD Crowley's last prayer letter.)

This is the official seal of the Pastors' Institute. The bottom blue panel contains the letters W.K.R., which stand for Wichiathan Krukongwiel Ratanakiri, literally Institute Pastor Ratanakiri.

Eighteen years ago, we started the Ratanakiri Bible School program, a twice-yearly provincewide block class for future pastors. Three years ago, the Bible school program split into four mother-tongue Bible schools, completely led, taught, and financed by the local churches here. Around 50 first-generation church leaders taught the five core classes of the original Bible school - Creation-to-Christ, The Book of Acts, and the Book of Matthew I, II, and III - to nearly 200 men, women, and teens in their own languages. Not bad for people who were barely literate when they came to Christ!

Those who successfully completed the mother-tongue Bible schools, and were chosen by their churches as leaders or future leaders with a good standing in their communities, were eligible to apply to attend the new Ratanakiri Pastors Institute, a twice-a-year program that will, after 10 years, be equivalent to an

associates Bible college degree. We are delighted to tell you that 75 students were accepted into the program after extensive interviews.

Our inaugural session at the Pastors' Institute began on Friday night, May 12, and ran until



Wednesday, May 17. The subject taught was Systematic Theology. Because of our constant emphasis on a narrative approach to the Bible, we have neglected this important subject. The missionaries and select local pastors taught 30 hours of Systematic Theology over the 5 days.

Our theme for this session was Theology for Worship. The study of theology is worthless if it doesn't result in the worship and praise of God. Satan knows more theology

praise of God. Satan knows more theology than any of us, but he still hates God. James tells us that the demons know the theological truth that God is one, and they tremble. What a terrible thing if both teachers and students study theology for 30 hours and are not moved to a trembling awe of our mighty, holy, and loving God. We desperately need your prayer that our hearts would burn within us as we continue to meditate on what was taught during those 5 days about the true and living God.

In other matters, an aggressive Korean seventh day cult that believes that a Korean man is the Christ for our age and a Korean woman is "God the Mother" has invaded our province, unsettling the faith of some. I prepared some documents

and missing soldiers, *just* during WWII, was 11,000,000! (Of course, these stats vary considerably depending on who is compiling the numbers.)

I also queried whether there was equivalent remembrance of Christians who were either martyred or perished while in full-time vocational service of God's Kingdom. The closest parallel I found was All Saints Day, which varies greatly between the Roman Catholics and the oldest Protestant denominations. As a Baptist, the closest thing to a Christian Memorial Day I know of is a missionary conference, and fewer and fewer churches are having these. Understandably, there are no figures on the number of Christian martyrs over the past two millennia. One point of controversy would be "Who is a Christian martyr?" and "Who was put to death because of the name of Christ?" Historically, many were martyred as Christians who in reality did not believe the simple Gospel of salvation through grace alone.

It does seem that it would be propitious to have one day a year to honor those whom we believe were true saints and gave their lives for the building of the Kingdom. Almost all of us know the story chronicled in *"Through Gates of Splendor"* of the five missionaries killed by the Áuca Indians. And we each could probably name a few others. But what an encouragement if, as families and churches, we honored those who have gone before us and shown themselves to have been faithful unto the end. There is so much more I would like to say on this subject, but will refrain.

I highly recommend the Iudsons' ministry.

Another late arrival was the Hancocks' baby boy. The Hancocks travelled to Bangkok, Thailand, several weeks ago so Becky could deliver in a more modern hospital. After being over a week overdue, **Hans David James Hancock** finally made his grand entrance into the light of the

As soon as Matt can secure the needed passport for Hans requiring seven Thai documents and eight Cambodia documents, the family will return to Kampong Cham, Cambodia, to take up their ministry with two other missionary families.

Continue to pray for **Kristine Espinel** in Montevideo, Uruguay, as her due-date for the birth of their 4<sup>th</sup> child is at the end of June. Because of a problem in a past delivery, a C-section was required. She

currently has the same problem. Please pray for a safe delivery. The end of the 1st semester of FEBU is also at the end of June, and Kristine is one of the teachers at FEBU this semester.

Kim Crowley left on time for her return flight back to Cambodia on May 8. She was in Chicago, IL, for three and a half weeks of April for the birth of Anna's second child. Kim came to Greenville, SC, on May 3 to visit three of her children and the 3 grandchildren who live here. Please pray for Joan especially as she relearns and becomes comfortable with the procedures Kami was once responsible for. And pray that we would soon have a replacement.
