White and Stripes

I truly enjoyed the extended vacation with my family and friends in Greenville, SC. I arrived the last day of October and returned to Uruguay in mid-January. I really liked getting to watch the snowfall in December. It was my first-time seeing snow covered roofs, streets, cars, and trees in person. Many trees fell throughout the city, including at the house where I stayed. Two very tall pines (I learned that they have shallow roots) fell at the entrance of the neighbor's driveway, breaking part of the fence between the two houses.

A surprising opportunity I had was visiting a small jail in Georgia, near the Alabama border. Interestingly, the person in charge of the prison ministry was saved while he was incarcerated years ago. He has a real burden to take the Gospel message to the inmates. As I have a similar ministry in my country, I was invited to join them during this jail visit. When we got there, we divided into several groups, visiting 2 pods each. A pod is a large holding area with about 30 inmates. A person in my group (who had also been a prisoner years ago) shared his testimony.

After that, each one of us sat at a table with 3 prisoners. We gave them sheets with Bible verses printed on them, verses like John 3:16, Romans 3:23, etc. After reading aloud with them, we asked them what they understood. This time of discussion gave us the opportunity to explain the meaning of

For me it was fascinating to see how prisons are set up and run in the USA. There are many differences between the prisons in Uruguay and the States, including the building structures, inmates' clothing, and cell doors. But the spiritual needs are the same. They need hope. They need to know about Jesus, the Mighty God, who can rescue them and make them spiritually free. Several showed interest in receiving Christ as their personal Savior. The results are in His hands.†
