Cheryl remained with her mother for the month to help sort things out, while Tim and the kids returned to Lima where the children's second semester classes had started. (South of the equator, August is still winter.) Though I don't remember having met Carl Monroe more than once, over the years I have heard many people speak of his love for his family and God's Kingdom on earth. For Every Purpose Under Heaven

King Solomon tells us, *To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven.* (Ecclesiastes 3:1) Our lives and our world are not controlled by an impersonal god, but by a gracious God Who *works out all things according to the purpose of His will* (Eph 1:11), and we can rest knowing that nothing takes Him by surprise or throws Him off course. In our last letter, we asked you to pray with us for some specific requests. We want to share with you how the Lord in His time answered and worked in the various ministries as a result of your prayers.

A time to embrace: Our baptismal service was held on July 7 at 2 p.m. at the Drava River. The forecast was for a cloudy and rainy day. But the Lord gave us sunshine for the actual baptismal. Then He blessed us with showers of rain, along with our showers of blessings. We praise God for Valentina, a young mother of two girls who got saved last winter and is going through a divorce, and for Ivan, Petra's brother. Both boldly testified that Jesus is their Lord and Savior. We pray for them as they continue in their daily walks with their Savior – for a steadfast faith and an ongoing growth in their knowledge of the Lord. Pray for Valentina as she faces a difficult time

her unsaved husband filed for a divorce before Valentina was saved. Pray for their two little girls, Lilly (age 7) and Rea (age 5). They go to see their dad every other weekend. Their dad is trying to get custody. The girls love coming to church and Sunday school. Ivan is a quiet and humble young man. He is in his junior year at college. One question that bothers Drazenka is, "Why did Luka have to die so we would make the effort to come to church? But we accept it as God's sovereign and perfect plan."

A time to build up and a time to laugh: This year's summer youth camp took place July 19-27 at the same camp site as the last few years, in the town of Povljana on the island of Pag. Each year we are faced with new challenges, but at the same time we experience new blessings and encouragements from the Lord. This year's challenges were, "How do we accommodate 168 people? Do we have enough tents? Is the kitchen adequate to cook meals for such a large group? Do

Summer youth camp in Croatia we have enough finances to pay for all the expenses?" Today we can say the Lord is faithful, and He provided for our every need. The 12 messages preached during the week were from Matthew 5-7, the Sermon on the Mount. The campers divided into teams and competed in different areas – but the main emphasis is always on God's Word and the memorization of Bible verses. This year, the young people memorized 1,986 Bible verses. Some of them memorized all three chapters of Matthew 5, 6, and 7. There were several unsaved campers. Every day they heard a clear gospel message preached. Please pray for their salvation. The two unsaved husbands of two of our church members, Goran, Natalija's husband, and Mladen, Zvjezdana's husband, came to camp again this year. Goran has been coming faithfully to church for the past year. He has been struggling with his sins, and the Lord has been working in his heart. He battled with the Lord and at the end of the week, he surrendered - he confessed his sins to the Lord and accepted Christ as his Lord and Savior. Praise God for the miracle of salvation in Goran's life. Please continue to pray for Mladen. He, too, is struggling. The Lord is speaking to his heart – pray for his salvation!

A time to die and a time to mourn: Two of our church members have lost their fathers in the past couple of months. Natalia's father died of a heart attack, and Antonia's father died three weeks ago due to several health issues. Both ladies are from nonbelieving families. Their families are traditional Roman Catholics. Pray for them as they witness to their mothers and their unsaved family members.

A time to build: A new church building? In our last letter we shared some pictures of a potential church building. As of today, the legal issues haven't been resolved. The owner wasn't able to fulfill his obligations to us by June 1st as promised. In the meantime, we have found another possible building. As you can see in the pictures, it needs a lot of work, primarily finishing! We are in the process of negotiating with the owner. The price is right and the possibilities are great. Thank you for your faithful prayers and for the gifts you have already given towards this project. Please continue to pray for wisdom

that we will make the right decision. Our current landlord has been gracious and is allowing us to stay a little longer.

(kj - A short time after the Crnkovićs' letter arrived, Tanja wrote to confirm that the property had been purchased for 55,000 Euros from their church savings. And the congregation has another \in 55k for much needed renovations. Replacing the damaged roof will cost at least 20,000 Euros. The Crnkovićs let it be known that they would be interested in building team(s) from the USA to assist in transforming this structure into a functional church building.)

A time to dance (rejoice): Andrea, our oldest daughter, will finish her freshman year in September at the Music Academy of Osijek. She has a couple more exams left. She will start her sophomore year in October.

Kristina, our second daughter, was accepted into the College of Education in a town called Petrinja (south of our capital city Zagreb). She wants to be a preschool teacher. It is about 2 hours by car from our home. There is no student dormitory, so we need to find a place for her to rent. There is a good Baptist church in town pastored by Natanael's (our co-pastor) brother. We praise God for opening this new door for Kristina. Pray for her as she enters this new path in her life.

Marko, our oldest son, is starting high school in the fall. At the same time, he will continue his music school education. He will be going to two different schools.

Tanja has successfully passed all of her classes and has earned her accreditation!!



Please continue to pray for the situation at her school. It is still uncertain if she will be able to continue to work there.

A time to heal and a time to build up:

Our family is presently *(end of July)* on vacation for a few days. We are resting and recharging our batteries for the next ministry which will start August 1st – distribution of Christian literature. Last Sunday, as a family, we were able to visit the Baptist Church in Sibenik – their pastor died a month ago. We used to visit this church during our ministry in Split. They are without a pastor, so our family was invited to come and serve through music and preaching from God's Word.

A time to die, mourn, weep, and love: While in the south of Croatia, we plan to visit the town of Split as well as attend two funerals. The Lord chose to call home a faithful servant – the wife of a pastor from Split who we have ministered with at the children's camps. The second funeral is for one of our former church members, an elderly lady who we came to love as one of our own grandmothers. We want to be an encouragement to the family members of both ladies.

I do not know of any of our missionary families who are "infanticipating" at this time, but a letter from our Camp Emmanuel caretaker in Uruguay let us know that **Luis Rios** will be adding two more grandchildren to his family tree. Also in Uruguay, two of our missionary families will celebrate two weddings for the same two children – September 6 for the civil ceremony and September 14 for the church wedding. **Analia Diaz** and **Jeferson**

Billafán are getting married. **Alberto Diaz** pastors Emmanuel Church of San Fernando, and **Pablo Billafán** is the pastor of Calvary Temple of Rivera. Having known this couple all of their lives, it's a real blessing to see this union.

While visiting in the States in June, Paty Donzé's health was amazingly good. Not long after returning to Uruguay, however, she began having severe back (shoulder) pain. The doctors are still trying to decide on the prognosis and treatment. Pedro, in addition to driving his wife to hospital visits in Montevideo – about 45 minutes from their house -is catching up on his work in the office and at Camp Emmanuel. Thankfully, Marcos Gomez was able to keep some of this work current. One major project has been in the planning for almost a year - the flooding basement/office at the mission house in Montevideo. It seems the major work has been completed and paid for. Pedro is looking forward to having the office moved from the first-floor "salon" to the basement again. I just learned, too, that Calvary Temple of Montevideo, just

two doors down from the mission house, was also having water problems in their basement, which are now fixed – and paid for!

A letter from **Chicha Rodriguez** in Uruguay was filled with interesting news. She has been visiting the **women's prison** in southern Uruguay for decades, holding Bible classes and witnessing to inmates and jailors. Recently, well, let me quote from Chicha's report:

"We began in May doing new paperwork to continue our ministry at the women's prison. According to prison authorities, they are now demanding a new registration for the religious groups that visit the prison. For many years, only EMU had a ministry of sharing the Gospel to the inmates. Recently more and more groups have started visiting the jail, all with different teachings and doctrines. After 6 weeks of praying, waiting, and calling, finally today, they gave us permission. This coming Friday, we will make our visit. Pray that God will continue helping us to sow the Truth, and that Truth will prevail over falsehood and deception.

"Meanwhile, a journalist called our EMU office in Montevideo. She was doing a report on the jail and wanted to learn about our work in the women's prison. We had a telephone interview. She had many questions. For instance: what religious group are we, why do we go, how long have we done it, if we are paid to do it, what effect or results have been achieved, what do we say to the inmates, etc. Great questions to explain the Gospel. When she finished with all her questions, she asked me if I had any questions for her... I told her, 'Yes, I have a question.' And that gave me the opportunity to speak to her personally about her soul!"

Chicha's schedule has also been dotted with speaking and attending ladies' retreats. In August, she taught at a ladies' retreat at a camp with Centros Biblicos in Paysandú in northern Uruguay. Then on August 18-19, she travelled to Buenos Aires, Argentina, to speak at a retreat for another mission organization. Chicha's sister-in-law, Sandra, was the co-teacher to about sixty women. September 18-21 a spring retreat will be held at Camp Bethel in northeastern Uruguay, which Chicha will help with. One of our former MEU missionaries, Zulema Kowalczuk Lopez, will be the teacher. October 16-19 will be the spring ladies' retreat at Camp Emmanuel in the south. A missionary lady from another board will be the speaker.

A winter semester break camp was held at **Camp Emmanuel** at which **Nicolas Gomez** taught on Joseph. **John Mark Steel** and another friend of MEU taught on Christian music. Thirty-six young people attended this very cold half-week of camp. They even had sleet one day. And there is no cabin heat! A very good group of men also attended the men's winter retreat at Camp Emmanuel.

We ask you to continue to pray for **Marianne Rauter**, one of our missionaries in Montevideo. She is still having difficulty as a result of a fall she had earlier this year. Also, she used to be our main Spanish/English translator for Uruguay correspondence. Her eyes have deteriorated to the point that she cannot continue this ministry. In addition, **Chicha Rodriguez** mentioned "in passing" that she (Chicha) fell in May and needed seven stitches! She says she is fine.

Last year I mentioned in an "Along the Way" that one of our part-time young ladies left her job because of continuing sin in her life. I would be remiss not to let you know that she wrote a letter to her church confessing and forsaking her sin. The Steels are working closely with her. We greatly rejoice in this! Pray for **Vanessa** as she seeks to follow the Lord once again.

The Republic of Uruguay has had a socialist/communist national government for many election cycles. And long before that, the capital city of Montevideo had leaders from this same party. Though religious freedom continues, taxes are high, and unions run the country. In the last several years, marijuana, same-sex marriage, "gender-identity," abortion, and many other "progressive" policies have been adopted – with the majority blessing of the voting populous. I've not held out hope that the country will ever turn around - until recently. I've been encouraged by two amazing things that have taken place, which I never expected. The first is stated in the above paragraph. The second is that it snowed in Uruguay. That rarely happens! One of our missionaries in Uruguay posted a video on Facebook of this phenomenon. In my 50-year experience with Uruguay, I believe this is the first time for a good snow since 1960. Our missionaries in Uruguay do ask that you pray for the October national elections.

Moving has been a major minor theme for EMU missionaries lately. On August 15, **Josh and Amy Jensen** kidnapped five of our grandkids and returned to Cambodia! It was wonderful to have their family in and out of the Greenville area for a few months. Their flight to Phnom Penh was generally uneventful. After taking care of shopping and business in the capital, they drove first to Ban Lung and then on to **Oyadao**. If you can imagine an un-air-conditioned house closed up (more or less) for months during monsoon season, that is what the Jensens *(continued on page 4)* Return Service Requested
