Coronavirus Spike in Lima

Covid-19 Situation (as of August 2020)

Perú as a country is currently in the top ten in the world for both confirmed cases of the coronavirus and total deaths related to the virus. Perú is in the top five in the world for deaths per population. The hospital system here is under much pressure. We are told that there are not enough beds available for all those who need care. The price of oxygen is very high since the supply is severely limited.

The country stayed in lockdown for twoand-a-half months until the end of May. Since early June, many people have gone back to work, even though many others continue to work from home. The public schools are not in session and will continue distance education until the end of the year. Churches, theaters, and all large gatherings are prohibited. The borders are almost completely closed to personal travel, and travel within the country is very limited.

In our church, there are three different families that have been directly affected by the Covid-19 virus. Willy Quincho's father and mother, friends of ours who attend Gethsemane Baptist Church in Lima where we worked for many years, have the virus. They are both in their seventies, and they need your prayers right now. Pray also for a young lady in our church named Keren who just let us know that her brother has the virus, and she is showing symptoms as well. Another young couple with two kids all had the virus and are doing fine, but the wife's father is struggling with it now.

Church Ministry

As a church, we continue to meet online, mostly via Zoom. At this point, we have small group gatherings on Monday nights. On Thursday nights, we teach a class. (We began a new series of classes in mid-August.) For Sundays, we prepare a video that includes music, Bible reading, prayer, and the sermon. We are considering shifting to a Zoom meeting for church on Sundays so that we can have a virtual gathering on the Lord's Day.

It has been hard not to be able to meet as a church, and it will probably go on this way at least until the end of the year, unless there

is a significant change in the crisis here in Perú. At this point, we have not sensed any targeted discrimination against churches. The restrictions continue to apply generally to all types of large gatherings. As we've considered the reality of the Pandemic here in Lima, we believe it's still wise to refrain from seeking to gather as a church physically. But we know we can't go on indefinitely as a church without gathering. We are praying that the Lord will give us wisdom concerning this issue as we seek to do what's right within the context of the crisis here.

Family

Our children started back to school the second week of August. Lauren, who is beginning her senior year, will be having a few classes on site at the small missionary school our kids attend. Micah and Abby will be doing classes via Zoom. Thank you for your prayers for our family as we navigate these unusual times. †

before **Henry Castro** and his family move into the house. (Part of those costs are included in the list of camp renovations and repairs below.) The Castros hope to be able to set up residence in October.

Customarily, we announce the needs and costs of the "Rick's Work Team" projects to be accomplished at Camp Emmanuel each October. Because of travel restrictions, Rick will not be taking a team to Uruguay this year. However, there is still a list of projects that need to be accomplished. Henry, whom I refer to as the Uruguayan Rick, will be working with Pedro Donzé, the camp director, to accomplish these projects, along with volunteers from several of our Uruguay churches. The projects are:

New roof for the caretaker's house - \$4,340 New roof and ceiling for the camp kitchen - \$3,494 (Last year the roof of the dining room was replaced.)

Convert the current kiosko into a cabin room for workers or speakers - \$7,680 (The kiosko is where snacks, mementos, and basic toiletry items can be purchased.)

Construct a new wooden kiosko by the pavilion - \$2,300

Expand the pavilion to make room for more games under a roofed area - \$4,789

Upgrade camp facilities to meet the new government requirements - \$710

Because Pedro Donzé had to cancel all the camps from March through December, there is a projected **deficit** of \$8,352 for 2020. So, we would like to raise this amount, too.

Currently, plans are going forward to hold camps again beginning in January 2021. Pedro is already assembling a team of summer staff and will begin their training in the months ahead. To that end, we are also announcing the **Sponsorship Fund** for Camp Emmanuel 2021. I hope to have firm costs per camper and worker to present in the October Newsletter.

The Bixby family, which had been Stateside since July 2, arrived back in Paris, France, on Thursday, August 27. I will not attempt to review the schedule they kept over the last almost two months; hopefully, they will write a report to their supporters that I can share with you. It was good to fellowship with them twice while they were in the Greenville, SC, area. The Sunday night before they started their flights back to Europe, they received notice of new regulations for entering France. This included negative COVID-19 tests for those over 11 years old. They scrambled to get the tests, and all of them received negative results - except Micaiah, whose test came back as "inconclusive." So the test had to be rerun. The Bixbys first flight left Charlotte, NC, at around 1:20 PM, and they still

didn't have Micaiah's results at check-in. The airline allowed the Bixbys to take their flight from Charlotte to Dallas, where their Paris leg embarked. Thankfully, while on the tarmac in Charlotte, just before take-off, the Bixbys received the results from their testing service stating that Micaiah was negative for Covid! Ruth wrote Joan shortly after arriving home in Sarcelles saying that the puddle flight was almost empty so everyone in their family could spread out. And there were no problems at customs and no quarantine!

JD and Kim Crowley return to Cambodia on September 8. In previous Newsletter articles, we informed you of Cambodia's expensive reentry policies. Thankfully, the arrival deposit has been reduced from \$3,000 to \$2,000 and only for passengers 14 years old and above. (This will greatly help the Kanes when they return to Cambodia in early 2021.) It has been a joy to have the Crowleys in the Greenville area again. They have had some quality time with their kids' families here and in Chicago. JD will be preaching the Sunday morning sermon at Hampton Park Baptist Church on September 6.

Lydia Kane has had more good days over the past month. She and Brian return to Charleston, SC, in September for another evaluation. Three of the Kane children are enrolled at HP Christian School full-time this semester, and the older three are each taking a couple of classes at HP, though basically homeschooled. The whole family has had COVID-19 this summer, but they are all well now.

I mentioned the physical pain that **Ursula Thiessen** was suffering last month. We just received a facetime call from **Chicha Rodriguez**, Ursula's dear friend, letting us know that Ursula is feeling much better and is finally scheduled to start getting the medical treatment she needs in Montevideo, Uruguay.

The Nuñezes in Cancún, Mexico, were finally able to host another gathering of their pastors from around southern Mexico. These reunions are a time of Bible study, discussion, and sweet fellowship. Marco and Gwendolyn seem to be doing fine.

Well, my space for this column ran out before my list of subjects did. Probably just as well! The Lord continues to supply the needs of our missionaries. The camp ministry in Uruguay is an exception, though no one is going hungry. Things are just real tight at Camp Emmanuel right now. We do covet your prayers and continued interest in the various ministries of EMU International. Thank you! †

Matthew Progress

Since our last update, Josh and the translation team met all their goals for translating the book of Matthew. In July, the committee of church leaders finished checking through the remaining chapters of the book. The team spent June and July adding footnotes and cross-references. Last week an outside consultant met with the team to check the last 14 chapters of Matthew.

So now the entire book of Matthew has been consultant checked and is in the final stages of revising. Please pray for the team as they work through the final edits and prepare the book to be printed.

The team has already begun to draft chapters of Genesis. Josh's co-worker is in the States for a year, and Josh has many extra responsibilities as he supervises all five team members (his normal 2 full-timers, and his co-worker's 3 part-timers).

Praise the Lord for the completion of the final check on the book of Matthew. Pray for the team as they work through the final changes and finishing tasks before printing.

Please pray for Josh as he supervises the team's finishing of Matthew and as they begin full-time work on Genesis.

Changes with COVID-19

As of the end of last week, Cambodia's COVID-19 count had risen to 246. Most of these are imported cases coming in by airplane. There is talk of Cambodian schools being allowed to open soon. We have seen no evidence of that in our province and suspect that it will be a while before schools in our region can open. Due to COVID-19, church meetings and other religious gatherings in Cambodia continue to be restricted to groups of 10 or fewer. Most Jarai Christians continue to meet in small groups in homes.

We continue to have our Khmer Bible study every Sunday evening. We've been able to keep the group to under 10 people. We have to wait until the religious meeting restriction is lifted before we can begin our neighborhood Bible Club again – there's no way we can keep the number to 10 or less. Amy continues to meet with our neighbor, Davi, to read the Bible once a week. Please pray that God will bring another Khmer believer into Davi's life to encourage her and that God would call at least one of her family members to follow Jesus.

Last month the Jarai ladies' leaders from Saom Kaning village asked to start meeting with Amy again twice a month to prepare lessons from the book of Matthew. Because regular church meetings are still not permitted, the ladies meet Sunday afternoons.

Please pray that soon churches will be allowed to meet again at full capacity. Pray that the Jarai believers will not grow weary during this time of meeting in small groups and that they will be diligent to encourage one another in the Gospel.

Please pray for our Sunday night Khmer Bible study: that God's Word would change the people who attend.

Our children finished their school year on July 1st. We had a special graduation ceremony to celebrate their accomplishments and allow them to perform for us. It was a fun evening for us all.
