### THE WINDING ROAD TO A NEW CHURCH

Finally, the date of July 24, 2022, arrived. We had been waiting for this day for a long time. Over three years ago, Daniel Hernandez began his training to be a pastor and eventually move back to his hometown of Bochil, Chiapas, Mexico.

Thirty-five years ago Daniel was born in Bochil. When he was three months old, his parents gave him to his grandmother because they were separating and neither

one of them wanted to take care of him. His grandmother raised him the best she could, not having much money.

When Daniel was 16 years old, he was invited by some friends to come to Cancún to work. Of course, they did not have any knowledge of God or our Lord Jesus Christ as Savior. He lived a life of sin for many years. One day he got in a lot of trouble. He was drunk and broke the windshield of a car because he was very angry. He was taken to jail and spent eight months there. I ministered at that jail for over three and a half years and was there while Daniel was incarcerated. At first Daniel would not come out to the services, but finally one day he came to the meeting. After a while we talked and I shared the Gospel with him. He was wonderfully saved. One of the prerequisites for him to get out of jail was to pay for the damage he had caused. I helped him with that, and he was able to get out of jail.

Once Daniel got out, I provided a place for him to stay, and he started coming to church. He found a job and I also began studying the Bible with him. He attended our youth group meetings, and it was there that he met Marisol, who is now his wife.

### **Camp Emmanuel Winter Update**

The recent activities at Camp Emmanuel have been varied. God allowed us to have three groups in the last four weeks, serving about 130 people. Two groups were from a Christian high school where, although the teachers represent several denominations, they have a burden to present the Gospel. These young people listened to the teaching here at camp, and they enjoyed our campus and the retreat. This high school has been coming to Camp Emmanuel for four years. Each student and teacher of this group sent in the camp evaluation sheets that we handed out, and they shared how much they enjoyed the camp. I thank God for strengthening my wife, Patricia, and Beatriz, the camp's office secretary, who, along with my assistant, Marcos Gomez, the camp caretaker, Henry Castro, and I were able to staff the kitchen. Although none of us have the training to be in charge of the kitchen, we managed, with God's help, to accomplish all the tasks successfully.

The last group camp was our mission's youth retreat for 12 to 20 year olds. There were 38 campers. Carlos Olivera, the pastor of Bethel Church in Pando, preached about the Apostle Paul's motivations for ministry, challenging the young people with the Word of God in several areas. In addition, we discussed other topics with the young people. I was able to have workshops about the importance of managing time well and the need for them to give God first place in their daily lives. I explained how to organize a day starting with the Word of God, doing

what they need to do second, and then having time for those things they want to do – always seeking the Lord's guidance. This has been a topic that many have told us is very needed in the lives of these young people as they struggle with knowing and applying priorities in their lives.

As I read the testimonies and comments of the counselors, I thanked God for each young person and the opportunity God gave them to be here. We were able to help six teenagers attend camp through the sponsorship program. I am very grateful for those who helped us with counseling and cooking. Again, Patricia and Beatriz managed the kitchen and did a great job. Pastor Gabriel Gomez of Gethsemani Church helped them, along with two other church ladies.

One young lady, who is losing her eyesight, has been coming to camp for several years, as often as she can. She accepted Christ through this ministry. Her time with us is always such a blessing and encouragement to each of us who interact with her. We prepare special material for her. Seeing how this helps her grow is a precious testimony.

We have watched a group of seven young people grow up together. They come from different churches, but they met years ago at a children's camp. We pray that they will follow in the ways of the Lord with lives of spiritual growth and surrender to Him. If they do, they will be a tremendous blessing to their churches and the Lord's work. However, not all of them are believers,

though they all understand the Gospel. We trust the Holy Spirit to work in their lives.

We have had other unique opportunities serving at Camp Emmanuel. Besides the recent retreats, we finished removing most of the dangerous trees around the buildings. A logging company cut them down and

the cabins are changed completely. There is more natural sunlight, and the humidity problem has less impact on the buildings and furnishings. For a few years it will be hotter in the buildings in the summer, but we were able to plant several species of deciduous trees around the cabins that will create a different environment with special color in each season. The trees will provide shade in the summer and let

the sun in during the winter. Henry, Marcos, and I planted about 45 trees, and we plan to plant 20 more before spring. Some of the trees are fast growing, so we think that in five years they will begin to give sufficient summer shade.

In addition, we created a new grassy area between the dining hall and the chapel. It required a lot of exhausting work, but we think it will be worth the time and effort.

One more thing that we have begun working on is the area where we hope to implement our largest long-term project. It is our multipurpose area, which will include housing for families to increase the opportunities to reach more groups, among other things. For now, we are performing tasks that do not take money from the budget. Everything we are doing is paid for through the sale of the trees that were removed. We are clearing the land in preparation. You'll hear more about this as we go along. We have drawn up small and achievable stages for moving forward, little by little.

We are very grateful for the gifts we have received for other upcoming projects. We have already started the process of buying our shipping container. We hope to have it by mid-August. It will allow us to safely store and protect a variety of items that we only need to use occasionally. Seeing how God is providing for His work humbles us.

We had 127 people in attendance. After the service we had a meal at the church. Many of the folks stayed for the fellowship.

We are very excited to see what the Lord is going to do in Bochil. God has had His hand on Daniel and his family. The great blessing is that God provided through His people the funds to purchase a small truck for Daniel to use in Bochil to transport people to the church. God also provided the money to purchase the land where the church/house will be built. In addition, God has provided all of the funds for building the house/church. God certainly is faithful and provides for His people and His work.

A house has been rented for Daniel and his family to live in while the construction takes place. We decided to wait until Daniel is there so that he can supervise the construction.

About two years ago, Daniel's aunt and son came to visit Cancún. They were saved and baptized at that time. They went back to Bochil, so they are waiting anxiously for Daniel and his family to get there to attend this new church, since they have no church to attend there. Also last year, one of Daniel's friends, Martin, who lives in Bochil, contacted Daniel. He shared the Word with Martin for a while. One day Daniel challenged Martin to put his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. He hung up the phone and a while later Martin called Daniel and told him, "I have put my trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. I believe He paid for all my sins on the Cross. So, I am trusting completely in Him." Many of Daniel's relatives have shared with Daniel the tremendous change they have seen in Martin. Now when Martin calls Daniel, he says, "I'm waiting for my pastor to

come to Bochil to start the church." Martin also plays the guitar, and he has already purchased a new guitar to use for the services. What a blessing!

Many of Daniel's relatives, including his father, are waiting to attend the church once Daniel and his family get there. Daniel had not spoken to his father for over twenty years. But now they are communicating, and his father is ready to come to church.

On Monday, August 1, Daniel and his family, with as many possessions as they can take in their truck, will leave for Bochil. I will be going as well in our car. Pastor Tomas from Playa del Carmen is going with me. We decided Gwendolyn should not go since some of the regions of Chiapas are not very safe. There is a drug war going on,

and different cartels are fighting for control of that part of the State. Pray for us that the Lord will give us a safe trip, that the first service that we have will be a blessing, and that souls will be saved.
