In September, we received news from Uruguay that Elsa Camacho passed away in her sleep. Elsa was the wife of Ariel, who was the former pastor of Gethsemani Church and a long-time member of the Uruguayan Board of Directors. For many years, when my father was the director of the mission and the early years that I was director, Ariel was the office administrator of the mission in Uruguay. Ariel retired in 2003 and passed away in 2018 after several years with dementia. Elsa learned English at the prestigious high school she attended in Montevideo, and she was such a fun lady to talked to. I called her "mom," since she was always teasingly giving me instructions when we were together - usually at Camp Emmanuel. Although in recent years she was unable to attend church due to health problems, and though I have not seen her for years, we will all miss her. She was a good pastor's wife and supported her husband in all of his responsibilities.

This reminds me that I have neglected to keep you updated on the prayer requests for physical needs that many of our Uruguay families are experiencing. Because the list is a bit long, the requests will be succinct:

Hot season has been survived; the rains are wonderfully welcome; "summer" break is over; and we are entering our sixth week of school already! This past year has been filled with joyful noise. Abi (1st born) and Isa (2nd) came back to Cambodia for their summer break, and our evening singing sessions were filled with their voices. Isa and Eden (4th) wrote and composed a song together that made me cry tears of joy each time I heard it. Bonnie Ruth has been setting scripture and scripture truths to music for the young church in the village of Na Ong. Each Sunday morning a growing group of Lao families meets together to come into the presence of their Creator with singing. They know that the Lord is God. They have learned that He made them, and they are His. I am so excited to tell you that we are hoping to have our first baptismal service soon. Pray with us! First, pray that God's faithfulness will extend to these young believers and to the many coming generations. Pray that He will reveal to the believers in Na Ong the areas in their lives that they no longer should put their trust in: protection charms, horoscopes, animal sacrifices, etc. Pray for Jeremy and Proin as

Not all missionary kids return to the foreign mission field, but many of them are so uniquely equipped to do so! All three of the older Farmer girls are actively pursuing missions. After growing up here in Cambodia, both Abi and Gloria have seen the spiritual and physical needs of the Cambodian people. Abi has changed her major to nursing, and Gloria plans to join her next fall. Is a sees the needs of missionary families and would like to pursue a position in missions similar to mine. Camp Emmanuel



Adolescents' Winter Retreat 2023

The Lord allowed us to have a precious group of 30 adolescents at the Winter Retreat who had a desire to know more about the Lord. I had the privilege of speaking with several of them regarding some doubts and questions they had about the Bible and their spiritual lives. The book of Proverbs was the basis for the teachings during this retreat. We took advice from King Solomon and applied it to our lives. The Word was very clear. We hope and pray that the Lord did and is doing a work in each one of the campers. We also had a couple of workshops focused on courtship and modesty. It was interesting to hear what the campers think about these subjects and then see what God says.

We had the Senior Youth retreat at the end of August. We started this new camp last year, and it was a great blessing for those who came. This year it was a longer retreat. Pastor Gabriel Gómez, my father, taught about spiritual gifts. Last year the campers

meet other young people who have the same love and desire for God. This meeting took place in our church, Gethsemani. It was great to see our young people get involved in hosting: some with the games, others with the music, some to help set-up the church (the auditorium had to be rearranged to hold more people than normal), others served refreshments, and others received our guests. It was a great blessing to see them serving in these areas.

For this meeting I had the blessing of sharing the Word. I spoke from Psalm 78, challenging the young people to take responsibility as "the new generation of Christians" within our churches. As part of this generation, we have the responsibility of reminding the next generation of what God has done and will do for His people, to warn men of the consequences of living without God, and to work to preserve the Gospel and prevent Satan from usurping the truth of Christ in their lives. We had a lovely time with a group of 95 young people.

Family

The last week of July we took a few days off to rest. By the grace of God, it was very helpful to renew our energy for what lies ahead. We continue to pray and ask that the Lord will allow Tali and me to buy a vehicle so we will not have to take the bus wherever we go. We would appreciate it if you will continue to pray for this need.

I also ask that you continue to pray for my wife's health. She continues to undergo medical tests. Several have been completed, but they still can't find what is causing her so much stomach pain. We ask that you pray for her and also for financial provision. Each test has a cost, and some of the tests are expensive. This month she will have about 10 tests.

Thank you once again for your prayers and support for our ministry. May the Lord bless you and continue to use you for His work. †

His wife, Graciela, has a severe problem in her lower back which has hindered her ability to walk. She is undergoing tests to determine a prognosis. The congregation in Tacuarembó is thrilled

to have the **Nicolas Gomez family** serving as leaders of their church now.

Pastor **Ricardo Windmoller** had an uptick in his high blood pressure this winter (US summer), so he has been put on increased medication. He and his wife, Mayka, serve in the church in Vergara.

Pati Donzé, the wife of our office administrator in Uruguay and director of Camp Emmanuel, has been suffering from chronic leg pain the last several months. The discomfort keeps her from resting at night. Her leg problems are probably a result of her being on her feet over the past months working in the kitchen at the camp. When Nicolas Gomez became the pastor in Tacuarembó, the camp lost its chief chef. The camp leadership asked us to pray for a reliable replacement. Pati is still undergoing tests to determine what can be done to heal her leg pain. Another request that **Pedro Donzé** has expressed is that the mission house in Montevideo will sell soon. The buying or selling of anything large in Uruguay is very complicated.

Marita Rodriguez, wife of the pastor in Treinta y Tres, needs a hernia operation, though this may have already been done before you read this. She still needs prayer!

I also look forward to all God has in store here in Cambodia over the next 8 months as we continue to serve our Cambodian brothers and sisters.

(Carlos Olivera well states a concern that many of our Uruguayan pastors have. Many of these men have been in the ministry for decades and are reaching or have reached retirement age; yet they have no one to take over as pastor of their church. Please make this a matter of prayer. - kj)

As always, it is a blessing to share about the work here in Pando. We rejoice in what God is doing in us as we work to build His church and teach men and women to follow Christ and learn to work together.

I am asking God to touch the hearts of

the young men in our congregation as they are the future of our church. We need committed leaders; but I do not see any with a desire to make the commitment to preach the Word of God. I continually seek to encourage them to serve the Lord in all areas of our ministry and show them the need to listen to His Word. I don't want to be the kind of pastor who is stubborn and will not retire. My prayer is that God will raise up a man, from within our midst, to be the next pastor. I know this call is of God and that He is the one who will bring the right person. I would not want it to be someone who does the work for convenience.

I am working with another Cuban couple. The wife, Lasarita, is saved and is very happy and excited about serving the Lord. After several hours of counseling and discipleship in July, she and her husband are understanding the Word of God better. They are showing a desire for the Lord that they did not have or show before. They come from the Lutheran Church in Cuba. She states that our church's teaching of the Word of God is deeper. She is delighted to be here. She is a woman who wants to serve the Lord and is willing to help in any way, even cleaning the church.

Some of our church members are having good meetings with the men, women, and children in the Barrio Talar area, just west of Pando. Elisabeth, Dayan, Maximiliano, Álvaro, and Yesica are a great team. They take responsibility for the Talar ministry and do not rely on me for motivation. I do not even need to attend the activities in Talar.

Regarding the Junta (MEU Board of Directors) meetings, I continue to learn and contribute as best I can for God's work. I am not working at Camp Emmanuel on a regular basis like I used to, but I always encourage our brothers to help and be useful there. Mabel and I were able to make a quick trip to camp early in August to see Rick Jensen. It was very good to be with him.

We are thanking God that my colon ulcers are well controlled, but I need to take care of myself. Mabel continues to struggle with her health, but when she is feeling good, she is too active. I have to keep an eye on her because if she doesn't take care of herself, her whole-body aches. We are happy to be tools in the hands of God, and a testimony and help to those we love. Everything is for the glory of God. †
