My further inquiries about the Stung Treng Creek's locations resulted in an interesting discussion of geography and further linguistics that ended with the meaning of Oyadao, the village where Josh Jensen lives. Missionaries are fun! So, please accept my apology for the great October blunder.

PRINTING EXODUS, CHECKING ACTS

At the end of 2022, we reported that we'd finished checking portions of Exodus (amounting to 2/3 of the book) with the committee of Jarai church leaders who provided local oversight to the project. Early in 2023 Exodus was checked by an outside consultant and approved for publication. A couple hours ago we held the first printed copies in our hands!

Rather than print Exodus as a stand-alone book, our team decided to reprint Genesis, Ruth, and Jonah along with Exodus so that all our OT portions are bound together. We plan to complete the New Testament before coming back to the OT. In addition to the printed copy, Exodus has been added to our Android app, along with high-quality multi-voice recordings of the text. Pray that churches would use these Old Testament portions in teaching and preaching, as well as in small reading groups. Jarai can also read or listen to the other completed books-now including Exodus-on our Android app. Most people, however, prefer to read from printed copies.

After our team has drafted a book, done a careful verse-by-verse check for exegetical accuracy, and then another verse-by-verse check for comprehension, the entire book is checked by the Translation Oversight Committee, a group of about 10-15 Jarai church leaders. We began our committee check of Acts the last week of September, and we plan to meet with the committee 2-3 days per week throughout the month of October.

In committee check meetings, we read the text paragraph-by-paragraph, review the main storyline and details, and then open the floor for comments and questions from the committee. We also ask the committee for guidance about key terms and other translation difficulties.

Evangelical Mission to Uruguay

In our first two days of meeting, we discussed our translation of the terms grace ("mercy-love"), apostle ("one who tells instead of Jesus"), witness ("to tell what one has seen"), and prophesy ("to bring the word one hears from God"). Our term for grace has been particularly troubling, because Jarai doesn't have a word for "gift." The term our committee settled on will need to acquire meaning through teaching and attentive reading (just like the English word grace, which mostly gets its meaning from the contexts in which it appears in the Bible).

After we read about Jews from the dispersion hearing the Spirit-filled disciples declaring the mighty works of God in their own languages (Acts 2), we discussed the Assyrian and Babylonian exiles and just why it was that all these Jews grew up speaking different languages. One of the pastors said that he'd read Acts 2 many times in his life (in Khmer and the dialect of Jarai spoken in Vietnam), and he'd heard many teachers teach it, but he's never understood the details. After reading and learning with the committee, he finally understood the story more clearly.

Three Krung believers sit in my office for 8 hours, twice a week, reading through each of the books of the Bible to try to find any last mistakes. Please pray for their health and endurance, and that the power of the Word would change each of us. In addition, we are preparing maps, a glossary, and verifying our cross-references and footnotes. This month and next, we will be finishing our read-through and then passing the text off to a typesetter, who will put it into its final format for printing.

The schooling for the older kids is a mix of online and in-home instruction, while the younger ones are still in the rudimentary skills best taught in person. Over the many years that Thave been writing to announce the Christmas Fund **Offering** and the **Camp Emmanuel Sponsorship Fund**, *it has always been* difficult to get in the mood. And, unlike tradition, these two projects are going to be dealt with in one article as I need to present both this month. For most of us in the USA, from where most of the funding originates, these represent two very different seasons: cold and hot. (In Uruguay, Christmas and summer camp take place in the same season, though different years!) Chronologically, the Christmas Fund is the most immediate need, but the Sponsorship Fund usage follows very closely, as decisions about camp are made in December for the beginning of the camping season in January.

The difficulty for me in writing about anything Christmas this early is that the weather here in Greenville, SC, is usually still rather warm. However, there has been a breakthrough in my mood in recent days: it has been cold enough here for Joan and me to begin using our wood stove heater, and at the same time, it snowed in our beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains, even closing part of the BR Parkway. This is a blessing for a moody writer!

Two Seasons, Two Opportunities

For decades, we have collected funds for a Christmas "bonus" for our EMU national missionaries in Uruguay. And since Tom and Connie Chapman joined the mission in 1987 (which is also decades ago, but not as many), we have also reminded our newsletter readership that the Americans could use special help and encouragement at this time of year as well. Now, besides Uruguayans and Americans, there are EMU missionaries with many different nationalities.

Here is how the Christmas Fund Offering

works. All undesignated donations to the Christmas Fund are set aside for the Uruguayan nationals. However, all gifts designated to a particular family will go towards that family regardless of their nationality or field of service. So, if you desire to specify an EMU family, please let us know, so it will go to the person of your choice. Again, special gifts at this time of year are not only greatly appreciated, but often needed.

The Camp Sponsorship Fund is

specifically for campers attending Camp Emmanuel in Guazuvirá, Uruguay. The funds are used to help with transportation costs, camper fees, and the expenses of our summer staff. (Some of the people working at the summer camp are EMU national missionaries who already have a salary. The funds are not for them. However, many of the summer staff are donating their time. They do not get paid for their summer camp work, but the camp has extra expenses for their food and utilities, and, in some cases, transportation.) The full cost of sponsoring a camper is about \$97 – depending on the exchange rate, which has decreased during this past year. If you prefer your donation be applied to a camper, a staff member, or both, please let us know.

We are inserting a return envelope in the paper edition of the EMU Newsletter for your convenience. However, for those who receive the digital Newsletter, or even the paper copy, who would like to give electronically there are several different options: credit card, your bank bill-pay, or added to your existing monthly ACH draft. Kim threw things into her suitcase, and we sped off in monsoon rain, praying for safety in the growing darkness. It was the worst trip of my life; the rain hardly let up the entire time. I can't guarantee that every traffic law from Banlung to Phnom Penh was honored, but we arrived at the airport with a few minutes to spare! Thirty hours later Kim was in the living room of a relieved Charis and Brian.

Kim spent the next 4 weeks caring for the Johansen kids as Charis and Brian attended to Job and his many needs. The surgery was a success, and Job's oxygen levels are getting back to normal. But after 4 weeks of tube feeding (his breathing problem caused him to aspirate his milk), he now has to relearn how to swallow. We are sure God will answer your prayers for this matter as He has the other matters.

Pray for Pastors School on Romans 12-16

November 26-29 is the final Pastors School session on Romans. You remember that the book of Romans (and Christianity as a whole) is virulently anti-karma. Karma, the bedrock of Asian religions, teaches "Do good and you'll receive good. Do bad, and you'll receive bad. Everyone must depend on himself." Romans teaches just the opposite: Receive good first by God's mercy and grace; then do good as a grateful response. The first 11 chapters have virtually no moral commands, because those chapters are all about what God did to bring us salvation, not what we do.

But a common mistake in Cambodia (and in the early church) has been to think that obedience and holiness are not so important in the Christian faith. Many church members and even leaders do not pursue a holy life. But true faith always works itself out in obedient love. Chapters 12-16 of Romans contain over 80 commandments! Please pray that our study of God's mercies in chapters 1-11, and God's commands in chapters 12-16, will ignite in us a desire for holiness, for "he who has been forgiven much, loves much" (Luke 7:47). †

It's our hope that the committee will complete its check of Acts by the end of October, so that we can prepare the book for an outside consultant to check sometime between November and January.

Pray

Pray that the Translation Oversight Committee meetings would be efficient and lead to good revisions in the text. Pray that the team and the committee would remain healthy, and that the committee meetings would be a good time of learning and mutual edification.

Pray that churches would use the newly

printed Old Testament portions in teaching and preaching, as well as in small reading groups.

Pray for Amy as she homeschools the kids and cares for Maria, who expects lots of time with her mommy.

Pray for Amy as she teaches the children's teachers at Saom Kaning Church the 10 Commandments (from the new translation of Exodus) set to music for kids. The kids will sing the song at this year's Christmas program.

Thank God that Maria received her U.S. passport, as well as a one-month Cambodian

visa, which is now being extended into a one-year visa like the rest of ours. †
