The retreats we have had this spring were a great blessing. The Youth Retreat and the Couples' Retreat were the final MEU/Camp

Emmanuel sponsored retreats for this year. We continue to host church and school retreats for other organizations until mid-December. These are groups that rent our facilities, but we supply the maintenance and meals. Our prayer is to use every opportunity to make our Lord known. It is very exciting to see the camp full every day. Some groups have more than 100 children! The work is not easy, so pray that God strengthens us and helps us maintain and take care of the camp during this time. Also during this time we are teaching classes every week via Zoom for the 2024 summer staff training.

I appreciate your prayers for the **Sponsorship Program**. There are groups of children and adolescents in the north of our country that we would like to reach. Many of these kids are from low income families, and if transportation costs are added, it is especially difficult for them. But we trust that we can reach many of them, as in previous years, as a result of your love offerings for this fund.

I would love to give you all the details of our family's anticipated trials due to economic cuts related to MEU's budget shortage, but it would be very long - and you know that I write a lot anyway! Today, we can share with you that the budget shortage has been covered for now. This allowed us to, once again, postpone the decision to change our family's health insurance. Please pray for God's provision to cover the EMU funds needed to prevent the cuts from occurring in the future. These trials take us to the limit in some cases,

but it is a joy to see how God responds and cares for us. So, October was a very stressful month in many

ways. (kj – Paty Donzé received a kidney transplant after a disease destroyed her kidney. The transplant and anti-rejection drugs, and control of the disease, require continuing costs. The Donzés have an insurance policy that covers some of these costs. Over the years, the monthly premiums have increased, but, as with insurance in the USA, other insurance companies will not cover pre-existing conditions, making it almost impossible for Paty to be covered by another plan. We were all aware of Paty's health care costs when the Donzés were asked to enter the mission and leave his financially secure secular job with a major bank. Even all of our Ŭruguayan missionaries approved. Over the years, the Lord has always supplied the extra funds to cover Paty's medical expenses, and we trust He will continue to do so.)

I ask you to pray for my mother. She has not been well after fracturing a lumbar vertebra, and her recovery has been quite long. We are helping my parents, but it is not easy for Paty. Her physical condition, between camping activities and cooking for my parents, has pushed her to her limit. We ask for God to give us wisdom to address this as well. Our son, Maxi, graduated from high school in November, though he will have to take some final exams in December. We are excited for him to finish this stage of education, and Lord willing, next year he will attend a university.

We had only one conference speaker: Pastor David Marini. Pastor Marini is known for his verse-by-verse expositional teaching. He traveled to India with Dr. Daniel Karunakaran, who is of Indian birth but is an American citizen, and his wife, Eva Karunakaran, who is from Germany.

On the first day, we had three one-hour sessions with Pastor Marini on Genesis 2 and Titus 2. Other sessions were led by our leadership and coordinators who shared their ministry reports and testimonies.

On the second day, we studied Daniel 2 and 9. Another couple of leaders shared their reports and testimonies about the sustainable teaching ministries of Good News Bible College and Seminary,

On the third day, we studied Revelation 13 and 19. My father and I shared our vision

and mission to advance the task of "every local church as a college classroom."

The fourth day was geared more to interaction, questions, and commissioning. The motto of this day was "Each one,

Pastor Marini followed his teaching notes, and these notes were displayed on the LCD projector screens in both English and Telugu as part of the expositional teaching and preaching methodology for our learning and understanding. Many of our pastors and leaders do not use notes from the pulpit, so this was a unique experience for our 126 participants. †

give up our rights and comforts to reach other cultures and races with the gospel." What a fabulous example and application for the Christmas message! "Giving" is a common theme for this season, but seldom do we really contemplate and encourage "sacrificial giving" – first to God and then to others.

In the last Newsletter in Along the Way, I mentioned my mother's 92nd birthday and how well she was doing. There is a stark update on that topic. The week after her birthday, on Saturday afternoon, Mom was using her walker to navigate across her room at Shepherd's Care, where she has resided for a few months short of two years. She does not recall the circumstances, but for some reason she fell backwards, first landing on her bottom and then hit her head on the floor. She had the wherewithal to press the distress button hanging around her neck and received staff assistance right away. Because she hit her head fairly hard, the resident nurse felt she should be transported to the emergency room at Prisma of Greer for an x-ray. She had a slight concussion, but further x-rays revealed that she sustained three fractures in her pelvis. Mom remained at Prisma for about a week to get stabilized and was then transferred to National Health Care's rehabilitation unit in Mauldin. Her week there was not productive at all and ended when chest pains landed her back at Prisma for another week. During this time, she made no progress at rehab. (In order to return to Shepherd's Care she has to be able to move herself from her bed to a wheelchair and vice versa, as this is only an assisted living facility.) The chest pains seem to have been caused by anxiety over the hip pain and her aversion to engaging in rehab. Her overall condition greatly deteriorated during these three weeks, leading the doctors to recommend putting her on "comfort care," i.e. no rehab or special intervention other than pain medication. On Monday, November 27, after Thanksgiving weekend, Mom was transferred again, this time to National Health Care of Greenville to the full nursing care wing. She is in and out of lucidity, but her pain seems to be controlled. Her children and their spouses have been involved in every step, but we, nor the doctors, know where this is going. We did clear out her room at Shepherd's Care, as currently there is no prospect of her returning there. One moment we are encouraged that improvement is possible, and the next we have no encouragement for improvement. So, we ask for your prayers for God's will for Mom's life and future on earth, and that He will give us wisdom as we have to make tough decisions concerning her care.

In closing this subject, let me gift all of you – old *and* young – with this simple advice: make a feasible plan for situations like this. Not everyone dies "with their boots on." And the problems of aging can be complicated and amazingly expensive. My parents made plans, and we are grateful that they did. I am blessed with a wonderful brother and sister and their spouses, and a wife who can handle most everything. I cannot conceive of doing this by myself. Remember, God will supply even in spite of our ignorance, but seldom in our negligence.

In happier news, Brian Kane has let us know that the Krung New Testament is at the printer and should be ready for the planned multi-church Bible dedication of this new publication in February. For a while it seemed that this would not be possible, but the Lord supplied in many ways. Brian and other leaders among the Krung are looking for a facility to rent that will hold all those who wish to attend this momentous ceremony. Brian also sent us pictures of the Thanksgiving gathering of all the EMU Cambodia missionaries in Stung Treng. There were no group photos taken, so this dinner-table shot will have to do. There were many other pictures of smaller groups.

October brought end-of-year school retreats. It was the first time for some of the schools to rent the camp. They shared how amazed they were with the environment, the facilities, and the desire on our part to serve them. Everything was in order, and they enjoyed their time at camp! Another returning Christian school said they always find 'something new' each year that brings them joy. The school director thanked us and commented on how beautiful the new dining hall bathrooms are. Maybe it's because they are new, but I noticed that campers are using the new bathrooms more than the bathrooms in the cabins and the chapel. Thank you, brothers and sisters, for your help, prayers, and gifts that have provided for the improvements of the facilities in the camp.

Last Saturday, the camp hosted a meeting of young people from all of the MEU churches in southern Uruguay. It was wonderful to see them here. We do not assume that all the young people who come to camp or attend their parents' churches are Christians. Our

prayer is that all of these young people will come to know Christ and/or grow in their relationship with God. May God bless the time they had here. The messages they heard from the Word were good.

One reason for prayer today is for God to send rain. I think I mentioned this request in a previous letter. The well that supplies water to the camp is having trouble. (kj there are 2 water sources for the camp: "city" water for drinking and our well for bathrooms and outside watering.) A few days ago, we turned it on again to be tested. It continues to have problems and the only solution is rain. At this moment, while I am writing, it is raining. We have not run out of water, thank God, but the well has been giving indications that there is only a little water in it. Be praying that God continues to send the rain that we need so much, so that the water table will rise.

Another prayer request is the financial situation of the Mission, which also impacts the camp. Pray that God gives wisdom for the budget to those who oversee it. Also pray for the sale of the Mission house in Montevideo and the best financial outcome for MEU and its ministries. This money will be put toward the Mission's budget. (kj-I'll give more history about the Mission House

after it is sold, but for now this short explanation will do: For at least 50 years the house was the center of mission activities and where the MEU office for Uruguay was located. All that has changed over the past decade, and thus the house is being sold.)

The work of the Lord in Uruguay

and at camp can continue because He is faithful, because He loves us, and because He glorifies Himself using methods and people from around the world. Every day He encourages us to continue serving Him and enjoy our service to Him.

#### **Marcos Gomez:**

A couple of weeks ago we hosted the annual Ladies' retreat. We are grateful to the Lord for the great time they were able to enjoy. For this camp I was serving in the kitchen, together with Pastor Nicolas Gómez (my cousin), Pastor Gabriel Gómez (my father), and Paty (my aunt and Pedro's wife). It was very good to be able to serve with them, as we were able to serve the Lord as a family.

There have been many details to take care of for the summer camps. I have finished preparing the advertisements for the different retreats and weeks of camp, and I am now finishing the design for the T-shirts. I am also working on the hand-out booklets for the campers for the Children's, Adolescents, Youth, and Family Camps. We are also training the personnel for the summer camps in January and February. We appreciate your prayers for this ministry.

Thank God we are fine. In the last week I have had a small health problem - a partial facial paralysis. But with medication, I am already recovering the mobility in my facial muscles. After the treatment is finished, I will have a CT scan to ensure that this is only an isolated event and not a major issue. Also, we continue to pray that the Lord will allow us to buy a vehicle. We would appreciate your continued prayer for this need. May the Lord bless you and continue to use you for His work. †
