The First Quarter

It may be less intuitive in April than in January to reflect on the brevity of life, but it can't be any less wise. An entire quarter and more—has gone; and we do well to pray, "Establish the works of our hands!"

January and February are months of summer camps in Uruguay. Our daughter, Elizabeth, worked three weeks in the kitchen at Camp Emmanuel in Guazuvirá, and she and Daniel James (DJ), her younger brother, both participated as campers. Some of DJ's classmates from Colegio Cristiano Cristo Viene (the school outside Las Piedras where Deborah teaches) were again able to attend. John Mark visited during the camp to encourage teens and families to consider Bible Institute class opportunities. He taught a series of messages from 1 Corinthians 15 at the GMSA (Gospel Mission to South America) camp in Paysandú, a ministry that especially serves a group of churches in western Uruguay and Argentina. Please pray for a young man who professed his faith in Christ during the week and for the significant percentage of unchurched teens. The time in Paysandú also served to promote FEBU and the possibility of a future in-person program for the Bible college, in conjunction with the camp, focusing on basic Bible knowledge and practical ministry.

In February we spent a week in Bariloche, Argentina, a trip that doubled as family vacation and a postponed school "graduation" trip for DJ. Though for years we have lived literally across the river (admittedly, at places, the widest on the planet), we hadn't visited Argentina since before moving to Uruguay in 2013. Recently this neighboring country has been a popular destination for Uruguayans who have taken advantage of far lower prices related to unfortunate economic and political challenges Argentina has endured. The Buenos Aires skyline, representing 15 million people in its metropolitan area, is clearly visible across the water from the Uruguayan city of Colonia del Sacramento, west northwest of Montevideo.

Classes in Uruguay began in March. As you know, our life tends to be tied to the academic year, since we're connected to numerous schools, either as teachers or students. This semester, for the first time in history, both FEBU and the Bible Institute have no in-person students. The online trend began, of course, in 2020, and since then we have often contemplated the pros and cons of the new reality. One of the obvious blessings is the ability to connect with students who otherwise would never benefit from classes in Montevideo. With the varying reach of these two institutions, we're currently serving approximately 80 students from Montevideo, interior Uruguay, and Argentina. Online classes have enabled

us to collaborate with ministries in the Buenos Aires area (a GMSA Bible institute) and Mar del Plata further south, where GFA (Gospel Fellowship Association Missions) missionaries Don and Ruthie Harris serve (in addition to their work in the inland city of Tandil). Please pray for these co-laborers, churches, students, and some of these students' unsaved family members.

Thank you for your prayers for Elizabeth and DJ as they navigate their educational and ministry opportunities. Elizabeth is in her final year of high school at a public trade school, focusing on Administration; DJ began seventh grade at a private middle school in Progreso, just up the road from where Deborah continues to teach English. She is increasingly encouraged with ways her teaching connects her with students and their families, and provides open doors to share the Gospel. Since 2016 she has been taking occasional classes toward an M.Ed. in Teaching and Learning, initially to support the ministry of FEBU and now especially to help improve her own teaching and that of others on the elementary level in Uruguay. Please pray for much fruit from her efforts.

During *Semana Santa*, the week preceding Easter, Elizabeth was chosen to take the boat to Buenos Aires with seven other

cellists from the national youth orchestra, in order to participate in an international cello festival. We thought it best to go along. The experience was both enjoyable and productive, not only musically, but also in building relationships with the group. Memorable experiences included visiting the national cathedral during a Good Friday service, meeting up with one of our students in the Boca neighborhood, and getting to know a sister church in downtown Buenos Aires.

The Lord has ways of reminding us of the transience of life. Elizabeth's first concert of the season took place in early April with a performance that originally featured Carlos Céspedes, a clarinet instructor in Montevideo and the principal clarinet soloist in the standing orchestra in the Teatro Colón in Buenos Aires. He went into eternity a mere six days before the concert. Following heavy rain several weeks ago, a long cement balcony collapsed onto the sidewalk leading to the orchestra auditorium seconds after a fellow cellist walked under it. Such events remind us of the opportunity and urgent need in this part of the world where God has placed us, our children, our students, and their churches. May we number our days in ways that tend toward wisdom (Psalm 90). †



- The destructiveness of immorality and divorce





Our next Pastors School session will be a seminar on "The Church and World Missions," using the Kairos program from Phnom Penh. The Kairos team will come to Banlung for 4 1/2 days of teaching and discussion, November 12-16. Their team will do all the teaching and facilitating, and any missionaries who are in town that week are invited to participate as table leaders and "resident missionaries," since none of the presenters has missions experience. Three Fellowship Church pastors from Ratanakiri have already completed the entire Kairos course in Phnom Penh, and I hope they will be allowed to help lead discussions. I also hope that there can be some panel discussion and Q/A with the Ratanakiri missionary community who have a combined total of over 200 years of missionary experience. †
