## CELEBRATING 50 YEARS

My mom broke her leg as a consequence of an illness, which began in July, and she needed surgery because she was in great pain. Although the surgery went well, she was too weak to recover. Sadly, she passed away on August 29. I believe the Lord was merciful to her and to us in taking her when He did, as we wouldn’t have been able to continue caring for her ourselves. Looking back, we knew she was ill for 40 days, but the illness was likely present much longer. Thankfully, she only experienced pain in her final days. I am grateful for His care, mercy, strength, and grace. His way is perfect!

Despite spending much of our time at the hospital in August, we continued working hard to finish all the repairs and improvements at Gethsemane Church that we had started in March. We celebrated the church’s 50th Anniversary from September 12-15. We not only renovated a new meeting area, but we also painted walls and floors. Pedro Donzé and my two sons, Marcos and Lucas, worked tirelessly to replace the old digital projector system, which was failing. They installed two TVs (one bought by the church and the other donated). It may sound simple, but making it work was quite challenging. By God’s grace, they managed to complete it on time! I am so grateful for their hard work, and I would be remiss not to acknowledge everyone else who also worked hard.

On September 8, after our Sunday morning service, 12 of us began deep cleaning the church facilities. We started at 2 pm and finished at 7 pm. It was truly a team effort! Our leader was ill and couldn’t talk very loudly, making it difficult to hear her, so we all ended up speaking softly, too. It was quite funny. Meanwhile, other groups were busy making decorations and cooking. One of the best parts of the celebration was hosting a group of brethren from the MEU interior churches who came to help us invite people in the neighborhood and distribute tracts at the market. We had

around 20 people for lunch and supper each day that week. Noemi González and my wife, Rosanna, planned the menus, organized the budget, purchased supplies, and created teams of two or three ladies to prepare meals each day. On Saturday night, we had the special celebration. We had around 100 attendees, even though our main auditorium only seats 80 (tightly). Marcos and Lucas prepared the back room to seat the additional 20 people for live streaming the service. On Sunday, we concluded the 4-day evangelistic campaign and 50th anniversary service with a big lunch for the entire church. It was a very happy week!

We often don’t take enough time to reflect on all the things the Lord has done in the past. The church started 60 years ago in this neighborhood and has been in this building for 50 years. I began attending the church around 45 years ago, making me one of the older members now. How could I not be grateful for all He has done here? It was so touching to see a short video about our history. Although it was brief, and we couldn’t find many pictures from the first 15 years, it was a real blessing. I hope it encourages the new generation to take up the torch and continue the ministry here. Times are different, and it’s challenging to find new ways to reach people. Many doors are closed now, but my prayer is that we do not lay down our arms and stop preaching the Gospel just because we face great indifference. God is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow!

September didn’t end on the 15th. From last Thursday to Saturday evening (September 19-21), we had the ladies’ retreat at Camp Emmanuel. (I was there, too, but in the kitchen with Marcos, Lucas, and Nicolás Gómez, the pastor in Tacuarembó – and my nephew, and Josué, the new camp helper.) Noemi Gonzalez and Rosanna were the retreat teachers, speaking on the theme “When Life Collapses.” They were asked

We continue to wrap up some project tasks left from the August Rick's Projects, and we expect these activities to extend until the end of the year. Looking back, we can only say, “Thank God for everything He has given us and continues to give.”

Regarding our family, I would like to share that Paty is progressing well. Her physical therapy sessions are yielding good results. Her leg is feeling much better, and she is now moving around more freely. She has visited the camp at times and has been able to do some chores, which has greatly

encouraged her. Thank you for supporting her in prayer and helping with her medical expenses. These busy days with the rental camps are challenging for us. We do not have a place at the camp for Paty to stay with me, so during October and November, I travel home regularly. Thank you for remembering us in prayer as a family.

Maxi continues with his studies at college, and the months of exams are beginning. He is doing well, thank God.

I must share that my health has been a bit complicated. After weeks of work on the projects in August, I had to see the doctor about my knees, as I was having trouble walking. After X-rays and ultrasounds, it was confirmed that both my kneecaps and ligaments are very damaged. Additionally, a cyst has formed behind my left knee, making it difficult for me to even drive at times. They are giving me medication to reduce the cyst; otherwise, it will need to be removed. Last week, I had an MRI to check for further injuries to the bones. I will see the doctor next week. I need to take care of my health, and I pray that God will give me strength, help me improve, and grant me wisdom in managing my time. I will keep you updated on this matter.

Preparations for Summer 2025 are underway. It is always encouraging to prepare for a new season of summer camps. We will have the opportunity to help several

campers, as we do every summer, through the Sponsorship program. I appreciate your prayers for wisdom to manage all the needs. In September, we began our summer staff training period with a day for new volunteers who wish to work with us in the summer of 2025. We are now finalizing the volunteer staff group and will soon start discussions with them to prepare for the different areas of the summer camp ministry.

This summer, we want to have a special gathering to celebrate Camp Emmanuel's 50th anniversary, but we know that organizing a celebration like this requires a lot of planning and resources. I have met with the brothers who assist me to see how we could have a time of thanksgiving and worship to God, along with an opportunity to invite the local community and evangelize. We want to honor God for His faithfulness in sustaining the Camp over all these years.

We thank God for the help that Josue Mendez has been at Camp Emmanuel. He has been with us for two months of his four-month trial period. Henry Castro enjoys having someone to work alongside him during these long camp days. Josue is very involved and enthusiastic, doing a good job every day. We have taken on his salary using the rental camps to cover the expense. †

After participating in the annual ACBC (Association of Certified Biblical Counselors) Conference in Fort Worth, TX, October 7-9, we left their airport on the 10th and flew to Kathmandu, Nepal, arriving there on the 12th. We then took a short flight to Biratnagar in southeastern Nepal. On the 13th, while there, and in conjunction with the Bethel Training Center, I taught *God’s Design for Marriage: Perfect Plan and Redemption*. We had a few ice breakers along with playing the “newlywed” game. Just suffice it to say, not everything translates easily!

School’s administrator, Jon Bright, asked if I could speak on Missions to their secondary students, and I did so on the 23rd, followed by participating in Seoul Bible Church’s evening service.

The 24th found us departing from the Incheon Airport at 5:25 pm, and after 12.5 hours of flying and crossing the international date line, we arrived in Dallas the same day, at 4:05 pm! We eventually arrived in Greenville at 10:29 pm. (*kj – I’m exhausted just reading this!*)

This trip saw us on and off 14 flights, traveling 26,696 miles (one circumference of the earth is 24,901). In addition to these journeying mercies, we saw God’s hand orchestrating a flight we had no reservations on, escaping a near riot on a bridge, and breaking a fever I didn’t know I had. (Suzie has posted many more on her Facebook accounts.) We sure appreciated your prayers as we navigated the various time zones, airports, and ministry opportunities!

Our next trip will be to Honduras, Nicaragua, and Cancun, November 14-26, where I’ll be presenting four more *God’s Design for Marriage: Perfect Plan and Redemption* seminars.

Our prayer for you is that you will “Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you” (I Thessalonians 5:18).
